State Road 913/Rickenbacker Causeway Ramp to Southbound I-95 to Close May 2, 2024

MIAMI, Fla. – Contractors for the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) will close the westbound ramp from SR 913/Rickenbacker Causeway to southbound I-95 and detour traffic from 9 p.m. to 5 a.m. on Thursday, May 2, for emergency repair of the concrete pavement on the ramp.

During this closure, drivers going west on the Rickenbacker Causeway who want to go south on I-95 to SR 5/US 1/South Dixie Highway should:

- Stay in the left lane to go towards Coconut Grove/ Brickell Avenue
- Turn left onto South Miami Avenue
- Turn right onto northbound SR 5/US 1/S Dixie Highway

Detours will be clearly marked during the closure. Access to and from adjacent neighborhoods and businesses will be maintained. Please note that access from westbound SR 913/Rickenbacker Causeway to northbound I-95 and all eastbound lanes will remain open.

Please follow all posted signage and note that this schedule may change due to bad weather or other unexpected conditions.
